

GOOD FAITH ESTIMATE

You have the right to request a “Good Faith Estimate” explaining how much your medical care will cost. Under the law, health care providers must give patients who don’t have insurance, or who are not using insurance, an estimate of the bill for medical items and services upon request.

- You have the right to receive a Good Faith Estimate for the total expected cost of any non-emergency items or services.
- You can also ask your healthcare provider, and any other provider you choose, for a Good Faith Estimate before you schedule an item or service.
- If you receive a bill that is at least \$400 more than your Good Faith Estimate, you can dispute the bill.
